EMS Update

A few items to ensure EMS division members are aware of:

- The older “probe” thermometers are being pulled from service. The new tympanic thermometers can be found in the action area in the bin on the right.
- New penlights can be found in A71 and A73 to replace the white ones that often flicker and provide unreliable light. There are new Streamlight metal penlights in the action area in one of the bins. It looks like a black pen.
- We have begun weeding out the older stethoscopes and discarding the ones that are broken beyond repair. Some new ones are being rotated in. They are a higher quality and will hopefully help in auscultation of blood pressures. Since they cost a little more than the old ones, please take care of them and make them last. The scopes that were in medical supply have all received new diaphragms and ear buds.
- The Combi-Tubes have officially been replaced with the new King-LT airways. They are for ALS personnel only. There is a protocol in the protocol binders that covers the King LT’s use. More training on the airways will be held in the near future.
- Just a reminder that A71 and A73 carry some rehab supplies / emergency food & water. There are MRE’s and rehab snack packs in both rigs. In A71, they are located in the forward upper cabinet (it is labeled). In A73, it is under the airway seat (labeled as well).
- We are replacing the orange hard oxygen cases with Ferno soft cases. They are blue in color and will contain the airway / oxygen supplies that were formerly carried in the Thomas pack. The intubation equipment will remain in the Thomas. A new contents list for the case has been devised to use when performing rig checks.
- Attention ALS providers, we have a new department protocol recently signed by Dr. Fouts. The protocol allows ALS providers the ability to administer certain emergency medications intranasal using the special mucosal atomization device (MAD). This capability saves time and is a benefit when IV access is difficult or dangerous, such as with an actively seizing patient.
- There are updated protocol binders in all the ambulances, including Luther and Roberts stations.

Medical Corner - Intranasal Medication Administration

Nationwide, the intranasal administration of certain emergency medications is becoming mainstream. It is non-invasive, painless, fast, and effective. On September 15th, our medical director signed a protocol authorizing our ALS providers to use this method for administering Narcan (for narcotics overdoses), Ativan (for seizures / sedation) and Fentanyl (for pain management).

There are times when IN administration is safer than establishing an IV, as is the case with an actively seizing patient. The only additional equipment required is a mucosal atomization device, or MAD, which goes on the end of a standard syringe. The atomization device creates a fine mist when the syringe is discharged into the nostril. The medication is easily absorbed by the highly vascular (blood rich) nasal mucosa.

IN admin works best for water-based medications, and studies are currently underway nationwide on addition medications that may soon be mainstream for IN administration, such as Glucagon (diabetic emergencies), Zofran (anti-nausea / vomiting), and Phenergan (anti-nausea / vomiting).

ALS providers, a copy of the new protocol can be found in the protocol binder located in each ambulance, as well as Medic 71.
